<p>Example A</p> <p>HGV traffic along Local Street has increased significantly, with Sizewell C's Traffic Management Plan (TMP) anticipating up to 600 two-way HGV movements per day in the early years of construction along this route specified as Routes 1a, 2a and 3a in SZC's TMP. Noise levels within the Hall as HGVs pass has been measured at 75dB.</p> <p>This is adversely impacting the 140 weekly users (on average) of OurVillage Hall, principally locals living within a 3 mile radius of the Hall. The age range of our users is between 0 (babies) and 100+ years old, as the Hall runs daily groups including mother and baby sessions, 'knit and natter' craft and social groups, 'homework clubs', 'pensioner lunch club' and a dementia-friendly café.</p> <p>In recent weeks, a significant number of users of the Hall have complained to staff regarding the noise of passing traffic, with people unable to hear conversations or the session facilitators, and young children becoming restless or distressed as HGVs pass the building. On 3 occasions in the last fortnight, sessions have been ended early as a result of the noise disturbances. As a result, we have started to see a decline in the number of people attending these sessions held at the Hall, with weekly attendance down 20%, risking a deterioration in the social and mental wellbeing of these individuals and their families, and an effect on the economic viability of the Hall.</p>	<p>Example B</p> <p>IMPACT – The perceptions around the influx of new workers into the area as a result of Sizewell C construction has negatively impacted the cohesion of the local community. Recent articles in <i>The Local Paper</i> have highlighted concern amongst residents and comments left by readers on the paper's website in response to these articles have been largely negative. Furthermore, there are limited activities locally for Sizewell C workers to undertake in their leisure time, and there is a need to create constructive/positive activities to prevent boredom and disorder.</p> <p>OPPORTUNITY – The quantity and diversity of the people working and living in OurTown while working on Sizewell C gives us the opportunity to launch community projects now that were not possible before due to lack of participants</p>

<p>Example A</p> <p>There is a need to reduce the noise level of passing traffic heard inside the Hall to pre-Sizewell C construction levels, so that the organisation can continue to host and run the series of regular community events held at the venue for the benefit of the community, without further disruption or decline in attendance due to the current noise levels.</p> <p>This project consistent with local plans and priorities, and the need identified in OurVillage Parish Council’s Strategic Objectives for 2024-25 as priorities for the community - objectives 2.1 (reducing the impact of energy infrastructure projects on local community life) and 5.3 (Support and facilitate events which bring the community together)</p>	<p>Example B</p> <p>There is a need to find positive and constructive activities that occupy the Sizewell C construction team outside of work, bring the community together, and reduce tensions between existing residents and Sizewell C contractors. (Joint response from SCC and district councils to EDF’s Stage 1 Consultation - “Tackling the social and community issues that will emerge during the construction and operational phases of a new power station will be a critical element in achieving the success of the project.”)</p> <p>A recent poll on the ‘OurTown Chatter’ group with 420 responses showed 8 in 10 residents in favour of activities which increase opportunities for access to the arts and culture, and for activities that reduce social isolation and increase mental wellbeing, showing a clear community ‘want’.</p> <p>This is in keeping with the Community Partnership priority of 2024-25 of increasing access to activities that support mental wellbeing; and OurTown Council’s Neighbourhood Plan 2022-36 strategies of promoting quality of life and providing for an inclusive community. Enhancing the vitality and vibrancy of the town centre is also listed as a strategic objective, which this project will help achieve through using community spaces in the town centre during the evenings and at weekends. The project also furthers East Suffolk Council’s Cultural Strategy 2023-28 (B1 Vision) to “celebrate creativity, nurture and enable a flourishing cultural sector which supports stronger communities”</p>

<p>Example A</p> <p>Grant funding is being sought to cover the cost of secondary double glazing the windows of OurVillage Hall to reduce the impact of the noise disturbance as detailed above.</p> <p>Surveys carried out by glazing companies have confirmed that adding secondary double glazing behind the existing windows will reduce the level of noise transmitted inside the Hall by 40dB, bringing it to a comfortable and manageable level, while also costing less than replacing the existing windows. As the Hall is not a listed building, no consents or planning permissions are required.</p> <p>The benefit would be felt by all 140 current weekly users of the Hall, allowing the community to continue to benefit from the wide range of sessions, groups and activities that take place in the venue. It is expected that completion of the work would reverse the decline in attendance at recent events, and could even enable the Hall to benefit from the increase in population in the local area, made up largely of SZC contractors, encouraging new attendees and increasing the sense of community cohesion in the area by running 'Getting to Know You' events in the evenings and at weekends.</p> <p>The delivery of the finished project will be undertaken by Windows4U, a reputable glazing company with over 20 years experience of commercial glazing projects, who will design and install the windows. The installation itself will take place over 2 days, with groups/sessions on those days moved to alternative timeslots during the week to minimise any disruption to Hall users</p>	<p>Example B</p> <p>Grant funding is being sought to enable the creation and running of a community choir for OurTown, to improve community cohesion between existing residents and SZC workers, provide opportunities for access to the arts for local residents, and to develop cultural roots in the town.</p> <p>Building on a successful formula of similar projects run across the UK, and with guidance and support from the Salvation Army and the National Association of Choirs, a community choir would be launched in OurTown with several open 'casting call' auditions publicised in The Local Paper and on noticeboards around town.</p> <p>The aim is to form a choir of between 40-60 people, a mix of SZC workers and existing local residents, who would be led by an experienced choirmaster.</p> <p>Weekly rehearsals would take place for 3 months, with public concert performances then taking place regularly at venues around East Suffolk including at 'The Woodland Theatre', local town and village halls, and culminating at an annual performance at Concert Hall. The income generated from ticket sales would help fund future performances, event publicity, and staffing costs for years 2 and 3.</p> <p>The organisation is committed to inclusivity and diversity, with a priority being attracting disadvantaged members of the community where lack of funds or resources is a barrier to accessing arts and cultural activities. To attract the widest variety of members, without cost being a barrier, the project will be delivered without any cost or membership charges for participants. Rehearsals will take place in the town centre, and free transport to and from performance venues for members will be arranged as required</p>

<p>Example A</p> <p>The double-glazed windows will significantly reduce noise levels from passing construction related traffic which can currently be heard inside the hall. Community events and activities which run from the hall will not be disrupted by the current noise levels and attendance will return to at least pre-construction levels. Hall users will have a better experience during their activities in a calmer environment. This will support them to attend frequently which will have a positive effect on their health and wellbeing. The improved hall will attract new groups and users, it's hoped this will include Sizewell C workers and their families, which in turn will generate increased income for the hall leading to improved sustainability</p>	<p>Example B</p> <p>The community choir will provide the opportunity for all members of the community to come together as one for a focussed activity where they can meet new people on a first name basis which will help remove barriers and negativity around not knowing newcomers. Members will feel less isolated and lonely within their own community as they recognise familiar faces at sessions and out in the community. Negative perceptions of newcomers will be reduced and replaced with positive experiences. The scheduled performances in the community will showcase the positive sides of having an increased population and what teamwork can achieve, providing utilising local talent in the community so that residents don't have to travel further afield to access arts and culture</p>

OurYoungTownners has over 10 years' experience working with young people in the town, is well known and regarded in the community, and can provide volunteer recruitment and supervision for the young people at all public performances by the choir

<p>Example A</p> <p>The use of the Hall as a community hub and event space is established, our role as bookings administrator for the building enables us to coordinate the works by liaising with session facilitators, and the work itself will be carried out by professional contractors</p>	<p>Example B</p> <p>The organisation is best placed to deliver this project as it is well established with sound operation and delivery history with robust policies and procedures in place. We have been established for 22 years with many of the same Trustees from the outset. We currently run a number of community projects such as a community food project so have significant experience to be able to deliver this project well. We have strong links with our community and over 35 dedicated volunteers who regularly support our activities. There is not a choir project in our community but we have visited the choir group in FarawayTown (who are delivering something similar very successfully) to speak with them and learn why their model is working and what we can use for our project. They have offered us ongoing support and perhaps even a joint concert!</p>

<p>Example A</p> <p>Feedback questionnaires were given to all attendees of the OurVillage Hall in the week commencing 03/06/2024 and 100 responses were collected. When asked "What would make your experience of using the hall better?", 73 respondents said new windows to reduce the noise of the traffic. The proposed project was raised at the Parish Council meeting in April 2024, with all members in agreement to support the project</p>	<p>Example B</p> <p>Following on from the poll in the 'OurTown Chatter' Facebook group, the organisation placed several adverts on Facebook and Instagram asking for expressions of interest to join/audition for a local community choir. We've received over 100 responses so far.</p> <p>Local councillor Jane Doe is particularly supportive of the project, pledging to help raise awareness of the group when launched through her column in <i>The Local Paper</i>.</p> <p>As well as being made up entirely of local residents and Sizewell C staff and contractors, a local musician has volunteered to accompany rehearsals and a team of volunteer event staff comprised of members of the local youth group OurYoungTownners at performances</p>

Measured by the continued existence of the OurTown Community Choir at the end of the funding period, with ticket numbers for year 3 higher than year 1, with weekly rehearsals ongoing and future public performances planned 2. Measured by establishing a baseline in both the community (via Facebook local group poll) and questionnaire as part of audition process of members, and repeating this annually to ascertain the change in perceptions of SZC workers and the cohesion in the community as a whole. Asking the question to non-members in the Facebook poll, and at choir performances, whether they feel the existence of the choir has improved their perception of community cohesion. 3. Measured by using the WEMWBS questionnaire with choir members and volunteers at the audition/interview stage and then annually thereafter, to identify any increase in mental wellbeing and reduction of feelings of social isolation, as well as recording positive feedback from members

The contribution to our core costs will mean financial support for our organisation which we have not been able to secure from other funders</p>

This is the number of unique people who will directly benefit from your project overall, as a result of the grant funding.

Be careful not to count people more than once. For example, if your project is to run 8 'one-off' sessions of an activity, and you'll have 30 places available per session that you expect to fill, then the number of direct beneficiaries will be 240 (8 x 30). If however, you're running a course of 8 sessions to the same 30 people each session, the number of direct beneficiaries will be 30 (1 x 30).

Lots of other people may more widely benefit from your project, for example if you were running an activity for children, then the families of those children will also benefit, but these are known as 'indirect beneficiaries' and should **not** be counted in this box.

If your project includes costs for staff members, think about how many unique clients they will see/help over the grant period (e.g. 1 year, 2 years or 3 years), as this may help you identify the number of direct beneficiaries; if you're a club or venue then you may have member/contact lists.

When looking over long periods of a year or more, it can be harder to get accurate numbers of unique clients/service users/attendees, so we simply ask that you estimate as accurately as possible

(Note: Although the Hall had 140 unique weekly attendees, to get a more accurate list of people who will directly benefit, this example applicant asked session facilitators/event bookers for the number of active members/attendees they have for their club/events. Across all events currently held at the Hall this was roughly 700. They know that some of these might be duplicates, (e.g. someone attending both 'Knit & Natter' and 'Weight World' sessions), but that's ok – there's only so accurate you can reasonably be!)

(Note: Although there will be 60 members of the choir, the expected turnover of choir members over the full 3 year funding period means the applicant has estimated 100 people are likely to be members during this time. Also, there will be several people volunteering their time in rehearsals and another dozen people volunteering at events – they are directly benefitting from the project too. In total, the applicant estimates 120 people will directly benefit during the 3 years. We don't count the audience at events - even though they do benefit, its more indirectly)
