






What does Suffolk Community Foundation do?

- We are a small but passionate team of 20 staff based in Wherstead.
- We are one of 47 Community Foundations in the UK
- We provide grants to help charities and community organisations who are supporting local people facing disadvantage to improve their lives.
- Since inception in 2005 we have awarded £43M to 3,346 local charities and community groups.
- In 2023/24 we awarded £3.4m of funding to 415 charities and organisations across











We manage 257 Funds of which 115 are Endowment Funds, 139 Grantmaking Funds and 3 Unrestricted Funds.

The Endowment Funds have a combined value of £21.6m.

To apply for funding, you will need...

- A constitution/governing document/Articles of Association/set of rules and a management committee with a minimum of three independent and unrelated members.
- A current Equality, Diversity & Inclusion policy that shows that your organisation is inclusive and treats everyone fairly.
- A safeguarding policy All organisations, not just those working directly with children and/or adults at risk of harm, need safeguarding policies and procedures in place.











To apply for funding, you will need....

- Your most recent end-of-year accounts. If these are more than six months old, you must also provide a copy of your current management accounts or a profit & loss account and balance sheet.
- You must have a bank account in the organisation's name which requires two signatories for all transactions. - You will be asked to provide a copy of a bank statement less than three months old or a paying-in slip.







The Assessment & Decision Making Process

- On receipt of your application, a grants officer will complete due diligence checks and write an assessment of your application. The grants officer may contact you at this point to ask for additional information to support your application.
- All the assessments will be sent to the fund's **independent grant panel.** The panel members will consider each application and make a decision whether or not to award a grant.
- Reasons for rejection:
 - Does not meet the fund's criteria
 - Fund is oversubscribed
 - Insufficient demonstration of need
 - Organisation has high level of reserves
 - Insufficient information provided
 - Sustainability/due diligence concerns













Current Grants Available

- **Suffolk Giving and Private Funds** Grants of up to £3,000 for charitable, voluntary and community groups that are addressing needs within Suffolk.
- **Stimulas Fund** Grants of up to £1,000 to support local grassroots projects that promote tennis in areas of deprivation.
- Sizewell C Community Fund Small and large grants are available to reduce the impact of Sizewell C construction on local communities.























Funds opening soon

- **The Food & Drink Fund** opening June 2025. Grants of up to £5,000 are available for projects addressing food poverty.
- **The Co-op Community Cares Fund** opening June 2025. Grant of up to £5,000 are available for projects that meets the Co-op's theme outcomes.
- **The Pargiter Trust Fund** opening July 2025. Grants of up to £5,000 are available for projects offering support or advice to older people.



■ **The Digital Inclusion Fund** – opening July 2025. Grants of up to £25,000 are available to reduce digital poverty in Suffolk.











Funds opening soon

- Suffolk Futures Fund As part of our 20th anniversary celebrations, we have created a new fund to support organisations who work with 16-25 year olds, helping to address issues with mental health, education, housing and employment.
- Our aim is to raise £200,000 by the end of June which will be 50% match funded so that we can make a number of grants to projects across the county during the second half of 2025.









Sizewell C Community Fund

- £23 million for East Suffolk's most impacted communities
- For projects that:
 - show the greatest potential for reducing the longer-term effects of Sizewell C construction activity
 - supported by the wider community
 - provide a positive and sustainable legacy





- Multi-year projects, max. 3 years
- Small Grants

 up to £10,000 per year (max. £30,000 over 3 years)
- Large Grants over £10,000 per year, no maximum
- Support available to apply

Application guidance

- Read the criteria and guidance notes to ensure that your project aligns with the aims of the fund.
- Make sure you include all of your supporting documents when submitting your application otherwise your application cannot be assessed.
- Look at the hidden text prompts on some application questions.
- Effectively describe the services you offer not everyone reading your grant application will know what you do.











Application guidance continued

- Outline your project brief and explain how it aligns with the aims of the Fund.
- Clearly demonstrate the need for your project.
- If you use data to evidence need, please reference the data source.
- Breakdown your project costs within the budget section.
- Wherever you can, mention outcomes and impact!

What we do...

- Part of the Economic Development & Regeneration department but also directly supporting Communities and other Council departments
- Work to secure external grant funding for the Council to help deliver priority projects and achieve priorities within the Council's Strategic Plan 'Our Direction'
- Manage / support a programme of business and community grants. We work to secure external grant funding for the Council to deliver projects / programmes
- Provide funding advice, signposting and funding application support to external groups / organisations / businesses.

Enabling Communities Budgets (1)



- Small-scale grants to support projects with clear community benefit that stimulate new community activity (to address a gap in services / provision) or that extend/grow existing community activity in East Suffolk – the aim of the scheme is not to provide funding across multiple years for the same project or activity
- Total budget of £412,500 for 2025/2026. Each of our 55 elected members has a £7,500 budget to allocate per in their ward to tackle local need. Budgets can be pooled together to funder larger projects and / or those which are out of a specific ward. Example projects could include (list not exhaustive):
 - Village Hall/Community Centre refurbishments or purchase of equipment
 - One-off events benefitting wider community
 - New community initiatives
 - Projects helping and supporting people with disabilities and their carers
 - Purchase of equipment, e.g. play, defibrillators
 - Youth groups and activities

Enabling Communities Budgets (2)



- To be eligible for funding, projects must deliver against the scheme criteria and deliver against the 'Tackling Inequalities' community priorities from our Strategic Plan
- Funding is open to Constituted "not for profit" community or voluntary groups; Registered Charities (registered with the Charity Commission); Charitable Companies Limited by Guarantee; Local branch of a national organisation; Community / Social Enterprises; Schools looking to provide community and/or extracurricular activities; Village Hall/Recreation Ground Committees; Residents Associations; Town and Parish Councils
- To apply: applicants need to contact their local Ward Councillor to discuss project ideas. Councillors will decide if they want to support a particular project, assessing it against the scheme guidelines. Following this, a short application will need to be developed collaboratively between the Councillor and applicant.



The project will develop partnerships between funders, the local authorities, charities, creative providers and communities, using heritage as a vehicle and catalyst for regeneration, engagement and education.






Ramsey Neighbourhoods Trust Ramsey: A Journey Through Time

Our Heritage Grant: £51,800

Ramsey, an isolated market town in the Fens, has a very long and important heritage. This project developed Ramsey's heritage offer highlighting the wealth and diversity of its heritage and providing a coherent and holistic story by:

- Creating a volunteer recruitment and training plan to increase volunteers ate heritage sites
- Workshops for young people and families
- Themed heritage days
- Coordinated offer across heritage sites and shared income generating opportunities





The Tramway Museum Society: Crich Tramway Village NLHF grant £83,875 (Total project costs: £88,875)

- Saving Heritage: The focus is organisational sustainability and outputs will ensure that this important heritage is saved and a relevant visitor offer is in place for the future.
- Protecting the Environment: staff guidance and environmental sustainability protocol and business planning will include a review of the museum's energy usage
- Inclusion, Access & Participation: by better knowing the audience profile and having a new volunteer offer, they plan to target audiences and be more inclusive in their volunteer recruitment adhering to the Society's Equality, Diversity and Inclusion policy.
- Organisational Sustainability: achieved through external resource to review audience data and improve data collection as this information will provide audience insight to develop future Business Plans, Strategic Vision and options appraisals.

- Community benefit society or cooperative society.

National Lottery Awards for All (£300 - £20,000)

National Lottery Awards for All



Overview:

- One-stage application process apply at any time
- Grants from £300 up to £20,000 for up to two years
- Can only hold one grant at a time and for a maximum of £20,000 within a 12-month period
- Prioritises groups with lower incomes
- Simple online application
- Please note, Awards for All is one of our busiest programmes and we are currently experiencing very high levels of demand.





We can fund projects that'll do at least one of these things:

- bring people together to build strong relationships in and across communities
- improve the places and spaces that matter to communities
- help more people to reach their potential, by supporting them at the earliest possible stage
- support people, communities and organisations facing more demands and challenges because of the cost-of-living crisis

Reaching Communities (over £20,001)

Reaching Communities

Overview:

- Two-stage application process (9 month process)
- We can fund single organisations or collaborations/partnerships between multiple organisations
- Grants over £20,001, running for up to 5 years
- Applications are online with other formats available
- Requests should be proportionate to organisation's income.
- Can be revenue or capital or a mixture of both





Reaching Communities – Priorities Overview



Our priorities are to fund projects that:

- Support places, people or communities experiencing poverty, disadvantage or discrimination (Equity)
- Support people and communities to shape the decisions that affect their lives
- Align with at least one of our missions.



Priority 1: Support places, people or communities experiencing poverty, disadvantage or discrimination (Equity)



We will prioritise:

- Places with higher levels of poverty, disadvantage or discrimination
- Communities that are least set up to help and support people
- Projects or organisations supporting people or communities experiencing poverty, disadvantage or discrimination.
- Projects that work to address barriers to participation



Priority 2:

Support people and communities to shape the decisions that affect their lives

We will prioritise projects that involve your community. By involving your community, we mean things like:

- Meaningfully involving the community in designing, developing and delivering your project
- Communities having real control over things that are important to them
- Your organisation being run and led by people with personal experience of the issues you help deal with.



Aligning with our Missions

We will also prioritise projects that fit best with at least one of our missions



Supporting Communities to Come together

Providing inclusive places, spaces and activities (either physical or virtual). Especially for communities where people are least able to come together.



Enabling Children & Young People to Thrive

By developing positive social and emotional skills.



Enabling healthier lives

By addressing health inequalities. And helping prevent poor health.



Environmentally Sustainable Communities

By engaging with climate issues and having a positive environmental impact. And improving access to quality natural spaces.

Reaching Communities: Stage One Application Questions



There are four questions, each with a word limit of 750 words

- 1. What would you like to do?
- 2. Who will benefit from your project?
- 3. How does your project support people and communities to shape the decisions that affect their lives?
- 4. Why are you the right organisation to do this work?



Reaching Communities: Stage Two



If your proposal is invited to the next stage, we will ask you to submit the following:

- Some additional information about your project and plans for delivery
- Financial information about your organisation
- A detailed project budget.



Reaching Communities: If you're successful



Grant set up

- Return your offer letter and recent bank statement within one month
- Start your grant within six months
- Grant induction meeting.

End of year & grant reporting

- How you've involved people from your community
- What difference the funding has made
- What you're learning
- How you're spending the money

National Lottery Heritage Grants is our funding programme for all types of heritage projects in the UK.

Use this guidance to apply for grants from £10,000 to £250,000.

Is this the right programme for you?

- Is your organisation looking to care for and sustain heritage in the UK?
- Will your heritage project run for no more than five years?



Developing your application

- Clear heritage focus
- Project need: why does your project need to happen now?
- How does it address the four Investment Principles?
- What organisations will you be collaborating with?
 (Include letters of support)
- Develop the <u>project plan</u> (& risk register)
- Have you considered the delivery risks?
 - Appropriate budget?
 - Sufficient timescale?
 - Appropriate staffing resource?
- How will you maintain the progress after its completion?





Costs you can include:

- New staff posts, volunteer expenses& training costs
- Capital works, repair, maintenance and conservation
- Professional fees, event costs and activities to strengthen your organisation
- Acquisition of heritage and costs associated with the purchase
- Contingency & inflation
- Evaluation



We cannot cover existing costs or any activity that has taken place before the grant is awarded



Top Tips from Assessors

- Get someone to read through your application before you submit, ideally someone not involved in the project.
- Address all four Investment Principles
- Be specific
- Good consultation and research is really important
- Consider project legacy
- A detailed budget
- Be realistic about your costs and time
